

RoHS EU Directive 2011/65/EU and amendment 2015/863/EU

Dear Madam or Sir,

We refer to the required declaration and inform you as follows:

Your enquiry relates to the restriction of the use of certain hazardous substances in electrical and electronic equipment according to Directive 2011/65/EU. In addition, this regulation sets out the further obligations of manufacturers, such as carrying out a conformity assessment procedure and affixing the CE mark to the product.

It aims to ban certain hazardous substances from electrical and electronic equipment. To this end, the RoHS Directive restricts the use of certain substances in electrical and electronic equipment. These include substances such as lead, mercury, cadmium and chromium as well as certain brominated flame retardants and plasticisers. The substances listed may only be used in electrical and electronic equipment up to a maximum concentration value, unless an exemption can be claimed for them in accordance with the annexes to the directive. The associated elimination of harmful substances is intended to improve the recycling of waste electrical and electronic equipment and reduce the harmful effects on people and the environment.

The consolidated version of the RoHS Directive was implemented in Germany by the Electrical and Electronic Equipment Substances Ordinance (ElektroStoffV).
